Garden Open House


The garden will be open to All during the Easter Egg Hunt. We still have a few plots available. Gardeners will be available to answer questions.

LAKE LUCERNE'S FIRST FISHING TOURNAMENT MAY 7TH 8 AM - 2 PM

LLECC will be sponsoring a bass tournament on Sunday, May 7th. This will be our first spring tournament and will allow kayaks and canoes only. No trolling motors will be permitted.

Registration is open first to members of LLECC and then available to people outside the community allowing an opportunity for outside fisherman to try their luck in our lake. The prizes will be based on the total inches of your three biggest fish. There will also be a side prize for longest fish. Pictures will be made with your cell phone showing fish measurements. Rulers will be handed out at registration.

There will be spaces for 20 kayaks or canoes and 30 spots for fishing off the 500 foot sea wall. Registration for boats will be \$20 for members and \$30 for nonmembers. Spots on the sea wall will be \$5 for members and \$10 for non-members. *NOTE: Dues must be paid by 4/1 to be considered a "member."

OUR COMMUNITY IS A WATERSHED

WHAT THAT MEANS AND WHAT YOU CAN DO TO PROTECT IT.

First article in a series on protecting our neighborhood's environment

A watershed is the land surrounding a body of water that drains into the body of water. Our community and the surrounding area drains into the creeks, ditches, and streams that flow through Lake Lucerne and into the Yellow River. If you care about the quality of your drinking water, recreational activities, and wildlife habitat in your area, then be aware of everything you do on your property that might affect the soil and water flowing downstream.

Everything we do outdoors, including treating our lawns and plants, washing or repairing our cars, treating garden or household pests, and also anything that would de-stabalize the soil affects the quality of the water in our Lake and beyond. One of the reasons we see so much silt returning to our Lake, is from erosion and increased disturbance of soil upstream of Pounds Creek. **But "upstream" also means our own yards.** Reducing erosion in your own yard is a basic responsibility of any land owner.

When rain falls on exposed soil, it can wash soil away from the land. This runoff can erode bare ground, wash away valuable topsoil and make landscaping more difficult. It also carries soil, nutrients and other pollutants into streets, gutters and ditches, where it then travels untreated to our lake.

These tips will help solve a lot of problems:

- Areas that cannot grow grass should not be left bare. Convert these areas to mulch beds. Don't try to grow grass where it won't grow its a waste of time and a waste of soil.
- * Keep existing native trees, bushes and plants on your property.
- Schedule large landscaping projects for dry weather.
- * Build terraces to slow the flow of runoff. Terraces are highly effective at slowing down water flow.
- Route downspouts and other drainage to heavily vegetated areas, not into yards or onto slopes.
- * Use crushed rocks, pavers or other alternatives that allow rainwater to seep into the ground for walkways, patios, drives, and under decks.
- Leave an un-mowed buffer strip of thick vegetation along stream banks and the lakeshore.
